Back to the wildlife, there were frogs that had a poisonous skin layer that the local tribesmen used for dipping the tips of darts into, then using them by the use of blowpipes to kill prey for food. The natives used to treat animals very differently to us, always for food, never for pets. Marianne gave our members a really interesting talk.
